The Issue: Another Influence




Reconsideration Process: Informal

- An individual identifies an offensive item
- Individual expresses informal complaint to someone they associate w/the library
- An exchange happens, and the individual is either satisfied or dissatisfied
- Complaint progresses until resolved or becomes a formal request for reconsideration




Reconsideration Process: Formal

- Reconsideration form submitted
- Review of the material takes place
- Ruling is made
- Appeal may take place
- Final ruling is made



Why Challenges Go Awry

- Policy +/- procedure is not followed
- Caught off guard
- Frightened
- Baited
- Rogue actions



Be Proactive: A Strong Policy

- Includes elements such as the library's mission, support for intellectual freedom, selection and weeding, and reconsideration (among others)
- Pass the <u>four-prong test of a legally</u> <u>defensible policy</u>
- Board and staff understand and know it well
- Review frequently, and revise as necessary




Be Proactive: A Well Rehearsed Procedure

- Develop a rehearsed speech
- Create talking points for staff and the board
- Role play, conduct drills
- Continued education and training that guarantees a calm, systematic response



Be Proactive: Build & Utilize Relationships

- Connect with allies
- Talk to service organizations
- Educate the public
- Inform your municipality



The Library's Response

- Stay calm
- Listen closely, respectfully
- Remain factual and unbiased
- Do not assume anything will remain private or off-record



The Library's Response

- Acknowledge their concern and right to express it
- Take the high road
- Stick to your policy & procedure
- Report challenges to <u>CCBC</u> +/- <u>ALA</u>
