

The doctor is in!



Welcome to our play literacy space!

PLay: Take turns playing the role of the patient, the nurse, the doctor, the receptionist, or a specialist. Use a nametag to identify your role.

Read: What does your nametag say? Look at the other signs around you - what do they say? Read a book while you wait for your appointment. Measure your height on the height chart and your weight on the scale.

Write: If you are a patient, sign in for your appointment at the receptionist's desk. If you are a nurse or doctor, take notes during a check-up or fill out a prescription slip.

Talk: Can you remember the last time you visited a real doctor's office? Talk about what happened. Depending on your role while you play, ask questions during your check-up or explain each step of a check-up. Describe what you see when you look at an x-ray.

Sing: A song may help you feel more relaxed during your visit - sing a favorite one together. Don't forget "Head, Shoulders, Knees, and Toes"!
